The Porch Radio

Remembering her grandfather's careful hands, she dried the contacts with the corner of her shirt.
- ③ By noon, the clouds had lifted, and sunlight flashed on the wet railing. Maya inserted fresh batteries, held her breath, and turned the knob. A trumpet burst from the speaker, followed by the announcer's warm voice. At that moment, her grandfather's truck rumbled into the driveway. Maya met him at the gate with the radio tucked under her arm. When he heard the music, his tired face opened into a smile, and Maya forgot her scraped knee.

1	How does the first paragraph establish both the setting and Maya's goal? Use two details from the passage.	The action takes place on a rainy porch on Saturday morning. Maya wants to fix her grandfather's rusted radio before he visits.
2	What three actions does Maya take after the radio stays silent? List them in order.	She presses the wire into its clip, chases the rolling screws, and dries the green film from the battery contacts.
3	Choose two descriptive details from the second paragraph that build tension. Explain how they make Maya's problem feel urgent.	Details may include the gust soaking the towel, screws rolling toward the steps, and Maya scraping her knee. These details add obstacles and show that time and rain may ruin her work.
4	How does the final paragraph show that Maya reached her goal and changed from the beginning of the event?	The radio plays music when Maya turns the knob, so she reaches her goal. Her grandfather smiles, and Maya forgets her scraped knee, showing pride and relief instead of earlier nervousness.
