A Poem Answers a Folktale

- ① In the coastal folktale "Mara and the Moon Boat," Mara waits on a cliff after a storm separates her from her father's fishing crew. She sees a small boat drifting below, but the current carries it beyond reach. Moonlight spreads across the water and guides Mara along the shore to a sheltered cove. There she finds her father and the other fishers, whose damaged boat has landed safely. The tale shows Mara paying close attention instead of giving up.
- ② After reading the tale, I wrote this response poem: "I am not the moon's path, / silver and certain. / I am Mara's listening ear, / turned toward the rocks. / A gull calls once. / I run, not because I know, / but because I choose to look." The poem keeps Mara, the storm's aftermath, moonlight, and the search near the shore. Instead of retelling every event, it speaks in Mara's imagined voice and focuses on her decision to act.
- ③ I changed the moonlight from a guide into something Mara questions, and I added a gull's call. These changes make the poem less certain than the folktale. In the tale, moonlight leads Mara to the cove where her father survived, while the boat itself is carried away. My poem does not name the cove or reveal the reunion. I wanted readers to feel the tense moment before Mara knows she will find her father. The response keeps the original theme of careful attention but explores uncertainty.

1	Name two details from the folktale that the poem keeps.	Any two: Mara, the storm's aftermath, moonlight, or the search near the shore.
2	What is one change the writer makes in the poem?	The writer makes moonlight something Mara questions, adds a gull's call, uses Mara's imagined voice, or leaves out the cove and reunion.
3	How do the writer's changes affect the feeling of the poem?	They make the poem less certain and help readers feel the tense moment before Mara knows she will find her father.
4	Why does the writer leave out the cove and the reunion?	The writer wants readers to focus on Mara's uncertainty before she knows she will find her father.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

I am the hare, awake at dawn, watching dust rise from the path. I did not nap beneath the tree. I slowed down to walk beside the tortoise. We crossed the finish line together. The forest learned a different lesson. I changed the ending so the hare learns cooperation instead of losing because of pride. This change makes the response about sharing success, not only avoiding overconfidence.
