A Practical Cover

- ① Members of the school board, our campus should install a covered bike rack beside the main entrance. The current rack holds bicycles, but it leaves riders and equipment exposed to rain. A roofed rack would make cycling to school more practical in wet weather and would show that the school supports students who choose an active way to travel. I am not asking for a large construction project. I am proposing a simple metal canopy over the rack we already use, with a clear path to the doors.
- ② During the first two weeks of April, I counted the bicycles at the rack before first period. On four rainy mornings, an average of six bikes were parked there, compared with an average of fifteen on four dry mornings. This count does not prove that rain is the only reason students avoid biking, but it shows that weather may affect the rack's use. I also spoke with eight student riders. Five said they had arrived with wet seats or backpacks after leaving their bikes outside during rain. These observations support a practical solution, not a guess.
- ③ Some people may worry about cost or about blocking the entrance. Those concerns deserve a careful response. The school could request price estimates for a small canopy before choosing a design, and the canopy could be placed behind the existing rack, away from the walking route. Because the project uses the current location, it would not require a new parking area. A covered rack is a limited improvement with a clear purpose: it protects parked bicycles from rain and may help more students view biking as a reliable option. I ask the board to explore this proposal.

3	Why does the speaker say that the bike count does not prove rain is the only reason students avoid biking?	The speaker acknowledges that other reasons may affect whether students bike. The count only shows that weather may affect the rack's use.
4	How does the third paragraph respond logically to concerns about cost and blocking the entrance?	It suggests requesting price estimates before selecting a design to address cost. It also suggests placing the canopy behind the existing rack, away from the walking route, to avoid blocking the entrance.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Principal Lee, the library should add four quiet study tables near the back wall. At lunch, I observed every existing table filled on three days, and several students worked on the floor. In a survey of twenty students in my English class, sixteen said they sometimes leave the library because they cannot find a workspace. More tables would give students a place to read, write, and meet briefly without using hallway floors. Although the library has limited space, the tables could replace two unused display shelves near the back. This small change would make the library more useful during busy periods.
