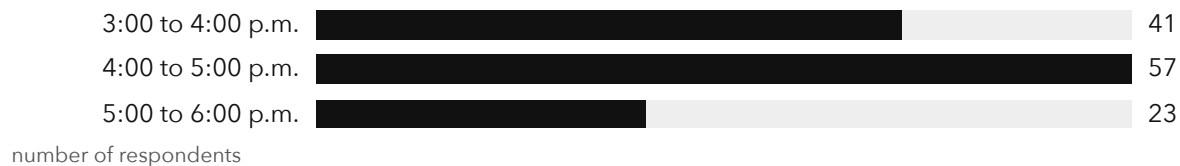

A Case for Later Library Hours

- ① At a school board meeting, Maya presents findings from a student survey about the library's after-school hours. She begins with one sentence that states her claim: keeping the library open until 5:00 p.m. would serve more students. Instead of placing every survey response on a slide, she shows a bar chart with the clearest comparison.

- ② The chart uses a zero baseline and labels its unit, number of survey respondents, so the audience can judge the difference without guessing. Maya says aloud that 57 of 80 respondents reported they would use the library from 4:00 to 5:00 p.m. She also names the survey's limitation: it represents respondents, not every student.
- ③ To add interest, Maya includes a brief quotation from an anonymous survey response: “I wait outside for my ride after practice.” The quotation makes the numbers feel connected to a student's experience, but it does not replace the chart. Her final slide lists the survey date, respondent count, and a link to full results so listeners can check her evidence.

1	What claim does Maya make at the beginning of her presentation?	Keeping the library open until 5:00 p.m. would serve more students.
2	Why is a bar chart a stronger choice than showing every survey response on one slide?	A bar chart shows the clearest comparison, helping the audience quickly see how many respondents would use the library at each time.
3	Identify two chart features that help the audience judge Maya's evidence accurately.	The chart has a zero baseline and labels the unit as number of survey respondents.
4	How does the quotation add interest, and why does Maya still need the chart?	The quotation connects the issue to a student's experience. The chart is still needed because it provides numerical survey evidence, while one quotation is only one person's view.

SLIDE ELEMENT	YOUR PLAN
Claim	The school should add two water refill stations near the gym.
Visual and data	A bar chart will show that 68 of 90 survey respondents refill water bottles after physical education, while 22 do not.
Interest element	I will include one anonymous quotation about waiting in line for a fountain.
Source and limitation	I will cite a March 2026 student survey of 90 respondents and explain that the survey does not represent every student.

Accept equivalent explanations that connect a media choice to audience understanding, evidence, or engagement. For the open task, accept varied school-related claims if the visual, evidence, source, and limitation fit the claim.
