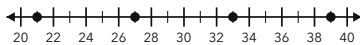

The first point and every jump match the rule. Check each jump on the number line.

For a different rule, start at 21 and add 6, these points follow the rule.



BREAKS THE RULE

At least one point or jump does not match the rule. Find the place where the rule changes.

For a different rule, start at 30 and add 7, these points break the rule.

CHALLENGE

Make a FOLLOWS pattern with six points. Then write one feature you notice that the rule does not say directly.

#	ITEM	CATEGORY	WHY
1	Figure 1 (numberline)	FOLLOWS	It starts at 3 and each jump is 4.
2	Figure 2 (numberline)	FOLLOWS	It starts at 3 and the jump is 4.
3	Figure 3 (numberline)	BREAKS	The jump from 7 to 12 is 5, not 4.
4	Figure 4 (numberline)	FOLLOWS	It starts at 3 and each jump is 4.
5	Figure 5 (numberline)	BREAKS	The first jump is 5, not 4.
6	Figure 6 (numberline)	BREAKS	The jump from 15 to 18 is 3, not 4.
7	Figure 7 (numberline)	FOLLOWS	It starts at 3 and each jump is 4.
8	Figure 8 (numberline)	FOLLOWS	It starts at 3 and each jump is 4.

Accept any explanation that names the deciding feature from the rule box for the chosen item.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **FOLLOWS:** 3, 7, 11, 15, 19, 23, 27
- **BREAKS:** 3, 7, 11, 16, 20

Challenge: 3, 7, 11, 15, 19, 23. The numbers are all odd.

Part 1 answers are 1 FOLLOWS, 2 FOLLOWS, 3 BREAKS, 4 FOLLOWS, 5 BREAKS, 6 BREAKS, 7 FOLLOWS, 8 FOLLOWS. In Part 2, students should name the start of 3 and check that each correct jump is 4.
