LINE UP AND COMPUTE

Line up decimal points when you add or subtract. When you multiply, multiply as whole numbers first, then place the decimal using the total number of decimal digits. When you divide by a decimal, move the decimal point the same number of places in both numbers until the divisor is a whole number.

WORKED EXAMPLE

Find $23.47 - 8.596$.

1. Write a zero so both numbers have three decimal places: $23.470 - 8.596$.
2. $470 - 8596$ -----
3. Subtract from right to left, regrouping when needed.
4. $470 - 8596$ ----- 14.874

Answer: 14.874

1. **\$37.46** Subtract the cost from the amount saved: $75.50 - 38.04 = 37.46$. The student has \$37.46 left.
2. **3.9 meters** Divide the total distance by the number of equal sections: $187.2 \div 48 = 3.9$. Each section is 3.9 meters long.

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Accept equivalent answers with trailing zeros, such as 53.620. For division with a decimal divisor, accept work that shifts both decimal points the same number of places.
