Democracy Requires More Than Voting

- ① A ballot box alone does not make a government democratic. Eligible voters need safe access without intimidation or unreasonable barriers. Elections also require meaningful choices, access to information, accurate counts, and transparent results. Consistent rules are insufficient if the rules themselves unjustly exclude people. Election administration, lawful observation, courts, and independent reporting can provide checks. If leaders silence opponents or alter counts, holding a vote may leave citizens without meaningful political power.
- ② An informed voter checks the responsible election office for registration, deadlines, voting options, and election dates. In New York, state and local boards of elections provide this information for elections they administer; school district elections use their own responsible officials. Federal general elections occur on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even-numbered years. State and local schedules vary. Official government directories identify current officeholders. Current official ballot information identifies qualified candidates; a campaign announcement or initial filing alone does not establish ballot qualification.
- ③ Compare candidate positions through campaign materials, debates, nonpartisan guides, and reporting that identifies its evidence. Campaigns favor their candidates, so check claims against records and other reliable sources. Check dates: candidates and rules can change. Distinguish promises from an office's actual authority. A candidate's statement shows what was said, not whether it is true. Research on housing, schools, or transportation connects voting choices to public decisions.

3	When do federal general elections occur in the United States, according to the passage?	They occur on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even-numbered years.
4	A candidate's website says that the candidate is running. What passage-based step should you take before relying on that claim, and why?	Check current official ballot information and its date. An announcement or initial filing does not establish qualification, and information can change.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

For a local general election, I would check the responsible board of elections for dates and voting rules. I would use government directories to identify current officeholders. I would check current official ballot information for qualified candidates. On transportation, I would compare campaign proposals with public records and reporting that cites evidence.

Accept equivalent accounts of safe access, meaningful choices, accurate counting, and reliable information. The research plan should distinguish officeholders from candidates, identify responsible official sources, and compare issue claims with evidence; no personal voting intention is required.
