A Butterfly's Long Trip

- ① Every fall, many monarch butterflies leave parts of the United States and Canada. They fly south to mountain forests in central Mexico. A single butterfly may travel thousands of miles, using the sun and Earth's magnetic field to help it find its way.
- ② Monarchs do not make the whole trip in one day. They rest, drink nectar from flowers, and lay eggs along the way. The butterflies need warm weather and food. Cold days and fewer flowers can make their journey harder.
- ③ In spring, new monarchs begin flying north. No one butterfly flies from Mexico to Canada and back during its life. Each group travels part of the way. People plant milkweed and flowers to give monarchs places to eat and lay eggs.
