Fireflies at Dusk

- ② A firefly floated near the tomatoes. Its tiny light blinked like a secret star. Maya held her breath and watched more fireflies rise from the grass. They twinkled over the yard, a small golden river in the dark. "Buzz, buzz," hummed a beetle near her shoe. Maya smiled but did not move to keep the moment quiet.
- ③ Soon, clouds covered the moon. The backyard became a blanket of shadows, and Maya felt a little nervous. Then her lantern glowed on the stone, making a warm circle of light. The fireflies drifted near it, and the dark yard no longer seemed scary. Maya walked inside, carrying the quiet evening with her thoughts.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Find two literal details from the first paragraph that help you picture or feel the backyard. What do they help you imagine?	Examples include "the sky turned purple," "cool grass brushed her bare feet," and "a robin gave one last chirp." These details help the reader picture and feel a quiet backyard at dusk.
2	What two things are compared in "Its tiny light blinked like a secret star"? What is the purpose of this simile?	The firefly's light is compared to a secret star. The simile makes the light seem tiny, bright, and special.
3	What sound does "Buzz, buzz" copy? How does this sound phrase help the scene?	It copies the sound of a beetle. It helps the backyard scene seem real and alive while Maya waits quietly.
4	How does the phrase "a blanket of shadows" affect the mood? How does the lantern change that mood?	The phrase makes the darkness seem as if it covers the whole yard, creating a nervous mood. The lantern's warm circle of light makes the yard feel safer and less scary.
