A Class Garden

The soil looked dry, so the class carried water from the faucet. Everyone worked carefully, but a gust of wind lifted the paper plant labels.
- ② Then Asha and Omar dug holes for the seeds. They dropped each seed into a hole and covered it with soil. The children wanted to plant tomatoes, but the day was too cool for the warm-weather plants. They chose lettuce instead, and the lettuce can grow in cooler spring weather. Its leaves can be picked again after they grow.
- ③ At cleanup time, Nora and Ben rinsed the tools. They stacked the pots and swept the path near the fence. The class saved the extra seeds, so they could use them another day. Rain began before lunch, but the garden beds already had enough water. The new garden was ready for its first week outside.
