A Garden for Our School

- ① Our school should add a small vegetable garden near the playground. A garden would give students a peaceful place to learn outside. It could also make our lunches more interesting. We do not need a huge space. A few raised beds, seeds, and watering cans could begin the project. Teachers and families could help plan it.
- ② First, a garden can teach useful skills. Students can measure soil, read seed packets, and watch plants grow. For example, third graders could compare how bean plants change each week. These observations would make science lessons feel real. Students would practice being careful and patient, too. Those skills can help in the classroom as well as in a garden.
- ③ Also, gardens can bring people together. One class could water on Monday, while another class could pull weeds on Tuesday. Families might donate tools or share advice about growing food. When people care for the same garden, they must listen and work as a team. For these reasons, our principal should approve a school vegetable garden this year.
