Labels at the Museum

- ① At the town museum, Maya studied a display about the American Revolution. A map showed the route taken by Continental Army soldiers after the Battle of Saratoga. The guide explained that the victory helped convince France to support the colonies. Maya wrote the event name carefully because important historical periods and events use capital letters.
- ② Next, Maya read a copy of the Declaration of Independence. The guide also placed two books nearby: *I Survived the American Revolution, 1776* and *The Boston Tea Party*. On a screen, Maya watched a short story called "Liberty's Lantern" and read an essay titled "Why the Tea Party Mattered." Each title began with capital letters for its important words.
- ③ Maya noticed labels about people who lived during the Revolution. One label described French help for the Patriots, and another told about African American soldiers, including James Armistead Lafayette. A speaker played greetings in English and French. Maya checked every label twice. Names of languages, races, and nationalities need capital letters, even when they appear in the middle of a sentence.
