The Bean Bed

- ① On Saturday morning, Maya joined the Garden Club behind the library. She carried a small notebook in her backpack and a trowel in one hand. The club planned a bean seed planting near the fence. Maya looked for weeds between the rows before the planting. The ground was damp from last night's rain, so the soil clung to her shoes.
- ② At the planting bed, Mr. Ortiz made shallow holes with a fork. He placed two seeds into each hole and covered them with soil. Maya wrote the date on a wooden sign for the new plants. After lunch, the club will carry water from the rain barrel to the bed. The beans need sunlight during the day and regular water during dry weeks.
- ③ By early summer, green vines may climb along the fence. The club can measure the plants with a ruler each Friday. During harvest time, students will pick long, firm beans from the vines. Some beans may go into the cafeteria kitchen for a salad. Others can be saved in paper envelopes for next year's garden. Careful notes in Maya's notebook will help the club learn from this season.
