Planning the School Garden

- ① On Saturday, Maya and Luis visited the empty lot beside their school. They wanted to plan a small vegetable garden. First, Maya measured the sunny side. Luis counted nearby water taps. The ground was dry, but rain had fallen the night before. They found that a broken drainpipe had carried water away from the soil.
- ② On Monday, the class chose a garden shape and made a list of supplies for the first workday. Jordan and Priya drew a map on graph paper. They raked old leaves and filled two buckets with stones. Some students wanted tomato plants, but others preferred bean plants. The class could buy tools, or families could lend them.
- ③ By Friday, the group had a clear plan. Maya and Luis would bring seed packets. Jordan would carry the map and explain the design to the principal. The class needed more compost, so Mr. Chen called the city garden center. The center offered a bag of compost, but it could not deliver it. Families could pick it up or ask a neighbor to help.
