A Bridge for Toy Trucks

- ① At the Riverside Makers Club, students planned a small bridge for a model stream. Maya wanted a wooden deck because it was easy to cut. Jordan worried that thin wood might bend under toy trucks; therefore, the group tested several strips first. Their strongest strip held six trucks. However, it was too wide for the stream, so they trimmed it carefully.
- ② The students sketched triangle supports beneath the deck. Triangles spread weight along their sides; consequently, the bridge stayed steadier during tests. The group did not use every design idea. A rope railing looked attractive; nevertheless, it blocked the toy trucks from crossing. Instead, they glued short craft sticks along each edge. The railing kept trucks on the bridge and left the road clear.
- ③ Meanwhile, two students painted blue paper beneath the bridge to look like water. They added paper fish, but the fish curled when glue dried. The students could have removed them; instead, they pressed each fish under a book overnight. Finally, the club placed the finished bridge on display. Visitors could roll toy trucks across it, and they could see the careful supports below.
