Bats Beneath the Bridge

- ① Each spring, Mexican free-tailed bats gather beneath Austin's Congress Avenue Bridge. The bridge was originally built in 1910; however, it was renovated in 1980. Narrow spaces under the roadway became useful roosts for the bats. At dusk, people line the nearby walkway to watch the colony fly out. The bats hunt insects over the city and nearby fields; therefore, their evening flight is more than a tourist attraction. It begins a night of feeding for them.
- ② Bridge workers likely did not plan for a bat colony during the 1980 renovation. Nevertheless, the spaces created by the work suited the animals. Bats rest there during the day; meanwhile, visitors can learn about them at viewing areas nearby. City groups ask people not to shine bright lights at the bridge. Instead, visitors can watch quietly from a distance. This choice protects the bats' daytime rest and helps people observe them without blocking their path.
- ③ People can support the bats in simple ways. Visitors can use official viewing areas; moreover, they can avoid climbing near the bridge. The colony eats many night-flying insects; consequently, scientists and residents study its role in the local ecosystem. Similarly, other bat colonies can help control insect populations in their own regions. Visitors should check local guidance before a trip; finally, they should leave the area as quietly as they found it after the bats emerge after sunset.
