Following the Monarchs

- ① Each fall, millions of monarch butterflies leave Canada and the United States for mountain forests in central Mexico. Before the trip begins, the butterflies feed on nectar and store energy. Because they cannot survive a cold northern winter, they travel south for several weeks. The journey is remarkable. No single butterfly completes the whole yearly cycle. In spring, the survivors begin moving north. As they travel, they lay eggs on milkweed plants. A new generation continues the trip.
- ② Monarchs use sunlight and Earth's magnetic field to help guide their flight. However, clouds can hide the sun for long periods. During these times, the butterflies may rely more on their internal compass. When wind speeds rise, monarchs often rest in sheltered trees. They save energy there until conditions improve. In addition, cool nights slow their movement because their muscles need warmth. Although the trip is dangerous, many monarchs reach Mexico by late October. There, they cluster on oyamel fir trees. The branches protect them from rain and cold.
- ③ Scientists track monarchs to learn where the insects travel and what threatens them. First, researchers place tiny tags on some butterflies before migration begins. If a tagged monarch is found, the person who sees it reports the code. This information shows how far that butterfly traveled. Next, scientists compare reports from different places. As a result, they can map parts of the migration route. Because milkweed is the only plant monarch caterpillars eat, people also count milkweed patches. These counts help experts decide where new habitat could support monarchs.
