Falcons Above the City

- ① Along many cliffs and city skylines, peregrine falcons hunt from high perches. These compact birds have long, pointed wings and dark markings below their eyes. A tall building can resemble the cliff ledges where peregrines naturally nest. From a perch, a falcon watches for pigeons, shorebirds, or other prey flying nearby. Instead of building a leafy nest, it usually lays eggs in a shallow scrape, a small hollow in gravel, soil, or other loose material. Adult peregrines protect the nesting area from intruders.
- ② When a peregrine spots prey, it may begin a steep hunting dive called a stoop. During this dive, the bird folds back its wings, which reduces air resistance. Peregrines can reach speeds of more than 200 miles per hour, making them among the fastest animals in the world. A falcon uses its sharp vision to follow moving prey, then strikes or grabs it. Hunting requires energy, so a peregrine may wait patiently on a perch before choosing the right moment to fly.
- ③ People once worried that peregrines might disappear from much of North America. The pesticide DDT caused eggshells to become thin, so many eggs broke before chicks hatched. After DDT was banned for most uses in the United States in 1972, populations slowly recovered with protection and breeding programs. Today, people can help nesting falcons by keeping a respectful distance from nest sites and following local wildlife rules. A report about a nesting pair may include dates, locations, and the number of chicks observed.
