A School Weather Study

- ① At Harbor Middle School, the science club wanted to learn how temperature changes above the ground. They built a small weather station with a thermometer, a wind sensor, and a data logger. The team could not send equipment into the sky; instead, they placed identical sensors at different heights on the stadium bleachers. The plan seemed simple; however, the students had to protect the sensors from direct sunlight. Otherwise, the sunlight could warm the devices and distort the readings.
- ② On a clear October afternoon, students recorded temperatures every ten minutes. The lowest sensor stayed in the shade of the bleachers, so its results differed from the higher sensors. The group expected the upper sensors to be warmer; nevertheless, a steady breeze cooled them. The students checked the wind data before making a claim. Consequently, they explained that sunlight, shade, and moving air all affected the numbers. Their careful notes helped them compare conditions rather than jump to a quick conclusion.
- ③ After class, the club made a display for the school hallway. One chart showed each sensor's temperature, and a second chart showed wind speed. The labels had to be easy to read; therefore, the students used large print and clear units. They also included a short explanation of their method. The display did not prove that one factor always controls temperature; instead, it showed how several conditions can work together. Visitors could examine the evidence and decide whether the club's explanation was reasonable.
