From Garden Report to Web Post

- ① When the Riverside Middle garden produced its first tomatoes, Maya wanted to share the news. Her first draft was a long report for the garden club. It listed planting dates, soil tests, and the names of every volunteer. Then the principal asked Maya to prepare a short post for the school website, where students, families, and community members would read it. Maya reconsidered what those readers needed to know first about the harvest and why it mattered.
- ② For the website post, Maya opened with a clear headline, "Garden Harvest Reaches Cafeteria." She explained that the garden's tomatoes would be served in salads during lunch on Friday. Instead of including every soil measurement, she gave one useful detail: sixth and seventh graders helped grow the food. She used short paragraphs and a photo with a caption so busy readers could quickly understand the news. Before publishing, she checked that the date, photo permission, and spelling were correct.
- ③ One reader, Mr. Chen, saw the post on his phone after work. He did not need the club's complete planting log, but he wanted to know whether the salad was available and who had grown it. A garden club member still needed the longer report because the group would use those records to plan next season. By choosing a website, a headline, a photo, and brief facts, Maya matched her published work to a broad audience while keeping the detailed report for its original readers.
