Sunday at the Library

- ① Members of the Oakview City Council, please include Sunday hours for the public library in next year's budget. Many students have sports, jobs, or family duties on Saturday, yet they still need a quiet place to research and read. Opening from 1:00 to 5:00 on Sundays would give families another dependable time to use computers, borrow books, and ask librarians for help. This change would serve residents who cannot visit during the workweek, when the building is open.
- ② Sunday hours are a practical use of a building the city already maintains. Instead of constructing a new study center, the council could fund a limited pilot program and review attendance after three months. Library staff could report how many visitors use the space, computers, and children's area. Those results would help elected officials decide whether the service is worth continuing. A careful trial protects public funds while giving residents a chance to show that the hours are needed.
- ③ Council members should also consider the people who speak at budget meetings less easily than adults with flexible schedules. A Sunday option could help teenagers finish assignments, caregivers find children's programs, and workers pick up materials. The proposal does not ask for every day to be longer. It asks for four Sunday hours and a measured review. Please vote to test the schedule, then use the library's attendance report when making the next budget decision.
