HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Pair students and read each row aloud, including all three choices. Have each student say the whole sentence to a partner before circling, and listen for a clear, audible voice and a complete sentence.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • SAY IT

SAY “Can you say each whole sentence to your partner before you circle? Can you use a voice your partner can hear and say each word clearly?”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Can you tell your partner, “A cat ...”? The page words are sleeps, sleep, and sleeping. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	sleeps
b	Can you tell your partner, “Two cats ...”? The page words are sleeps, sleep, and sleeping. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	sleep
c	Can you tell your partner, “The baby is ...”? The page words are sleep, sleeps, and sleeping. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	sleeping

PART 2 • SHARE IT

SAY “Can you share each sentence with your partner before you circle? Can you say the words so your partner can understand every word?”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Can you tell your partner, “The bird ...”? The page words are fly, flies, and flying. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	flies
b	Can you tell your partner, “The birds are ...”? The page words are fly, flies, and flying. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	flying
c	Can you tell your partner, “One dog ...”? The page words are barks, bark, and barking. Which word makes a complete sentence, and which word will you circle after you say it clearly?	barks

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Accept a response when the student says the complete sentence with the correct ending in an audible, understandable voice. Circle answers are 0, 1, 2 in the first part and 1, 2, 0 in the second part.
