HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Read each part aloud and give spelling support as students add their own short words. Students use a simple word plan, then dictate a series of dog sentences that have a subject, a matching action word, and describing words. Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • MATCH WORDS

SAY “Look at the words on the left and the action words on the right. Which action word makes a complete sentence with each word on the left? Draw a line to each matching action word.”

- **Dog** matches **runs**
- **Dogs** matches **run**
- **Pup** matches **plays**

PART 2 • PLAN WORDS

SAY “The word Dog is beside each box. What describing word can you write in the first box, what doing word can you write in the second box, and what other describing word can you write in the third box? Tell me a sentence for each word, and I will write your sentences.”

- Box 1 (beside Dog): **Any short describing word that fits one dog, such as big, soft, or happy.**
- Box 2 (beside Dog): **Any short action word that fits one dog and agrees with Dog, such as runs, naps, or hops.**
- Box 3 (beside Dog): **Any short describing word that fits one dog, such as fast, small, or brown.**

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Match lines: Dog to runs, Dogs to run, and Pup to plays. Accept sensible student-generated describing and action words, then help the student dictate focused dog sentences using the planned words.
