### Following the Evidence

- ① Researchers build trust by showing where each borrowed idea began. A primary source comes directly from the time, person, or event being studied, such as a speech, diary, photograph, interview, or data set. A secondary source examines, explains, or interprets primary evidence. A historian's article that analyzes several Civil War letters is secondary, even though the letters are primary. Before writing, record each source's author, title, publication information, page numbers, and web address when available. Those notes help readers locate the evidence and help writers avoid blending another person's ideas into their own.
- ② MLA in-text citations connect a borrowed passage to a full entry on a Works Cited page. For a direct quotation, copy the words exactly, place them in quotation marks, and identify the source. If the author's name does not appear in the sentence, put the author's last name and the page number in parentheses, as in: “...” (Nguyen 18). When a signal phrase names the author, include only the page number in parentheses: Nguyen observes, “...” (18). A quotation should support your point, not replace your explanation.
- ③ Paraphrasing means restating a source's idea completely in your own sentence structure and wording. It still needs a citation because the idea belongs to the source. In MLA, an online source without page numbers usually needs the author's name in parentheses when the sentence does not name that author. If no author is listed, use a shortened version of the title in quotation marks, for example: (“River Study”). Use the same source details in your Works Cited entry, so readers can match the brief citation to the complete source.
