Maya Builds a Responsible Podcast

- ① For a podcast episode about city heat islands, Maya gathers information from a university climate report, a local news interview, and a government data page. She records each source's author, title, date, link, and the date she viewed it. In her notes, she puts exact words in quotation marks and writes paraphrases in her own words. These habits help her trace every claim. She also checks whether a website names its author, supports claims with evidence, and has a purpose beyond selling a product. Reliable research begins before drafting.
- ② While drafting, Maya cannot copy a reporter's sentences and place them in her script without quotation marks and credit. Presenting another person's words, ideas, images, or structure as her own is plagiarism. Even when she changes a few words, a borrowed idea needs attribution. Plagiarism is an ethical violation because it hides the creator's work and misleads an audience about who did the research. Schools, publishers, and employers may respond with consequences such as a failing grade, loss of trust, rejection of work, or discipline under their policies.
- ③ Credit does not automatically give Maya permission to reuse every item she finds online. Copyright law protects many original works, including articles, photographs, videos, and graphics. Copying or sharing protected material without permission can create legal consequences, depending on the use and the law. She looks for a license, follows its terms, requests permission when needed, and uses public-domain material only after confirming its status. For a short quotation, she cites the source and uses only what supports her point. She does not assume that material is free simply because it appears in a search result.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

For a report on urban trees, I would use the U.S. Forest Service's Urban and Community Forestry page and paraphrase its explanation that trees can reduce heat by shading paved surfaces and releasing water vapor. I would cite the agency, page title, URL, and access date, and I would use a Forest Service image only if its license permits reuse or request permission.
