Two Stories, Two Forms

- ① Henrik Ibsen's 1879 play *A Doll's House* unfolds in a middle-class Norwegian home. In Ibsen's society, married women had limited legal and financial independence. Nora Helmer secretly borrowed money and forged her father's signature to save her husband, Torvald, during an illness. The play's dialogue and stage directions show Torvald treating Nora as a child, calling her pet names and controlling money. When Nora sees that Torvald values his reputation above her sacrifice, she leaves. The social limits of her time make her choice startling and shape her development from a sheltered wife into a person demanding self-respect.
- ② Ken Liu's 2011 short story "The Paper Menagerie" follows Jack, the U.S.-born son of a Chinese immigrant mother and an American father. Jack narrates in first person as an adult remembering childhood. At school, he is embarrassed by his mother's accent, food, and paper animals, so he rejects the Chinese language and objects that once comforted him. This point of view lets readers hear his later regret. The story reflects pressures that some children of immigrants face when they feel pushed to fit a dominant culture. Jack's growth begins only after he reads his mother's letter and recognizes the love behind the traditions he dismissed.
- ③ Although the works use different forms, each saves a letter for a late turning point. Krogstad's letter exposes Nora's secret loan and forces her to judge Torvald's response. In Jack's story, his mother's letter reveals experiences he did not understand, changing how he sees her after her death. *A Doll's House* moves through spoken scenes and visible actions in a short span of time, a convention of drama. The prose story can enter Jack's memories and cover years, creating a reflective style. Thus, both plots use a written revelation, but the play stages an immediate conflict while the story uses retrospective narration.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Set in 1950s Chicago, *A Raisin in the Sun* shows how housing discrimination limits the Younger family's choices, while "Everyday Use" explores disagreements about African American heritage. The play uses dialogue and stage action, but the story uses Mama's first-person narration, so readers receive her judgments of Dee. Both works build toward a confrontation about a valued family possession or opportunity, but the play develops its conflict across several scenes while the story centers on one visit.

Accept equivalent explanations that connect context to character choices, point of view, style, or form. For structural comparisons, students must name a shared plot method and a genuine difference in how the two works organize or present events.
