An implied idea is suggested through details, actions, or descriptions. You infer the idea because the author does not say it plainly.

2	"Jia keeps her coat on indoors and blows into her hands."	IMPLIED	Her actions suggest that she is cold, but the text does not state it.
3	"The narrator admits, 'I wanted the crown more than I wanted peace.'"	STATED	The narrator directly states the desire for the crown.
4	"At dawn, the messenger arrives with news that the treaty has failed."	STATED	The treaty's failure is explicitly stated.
5	"When the drums begin, Amari slips behind the curtain instead of joining the celebration."	IMPLIED	Amari's action suggests a feeling or motive without directly naming one.
6	"Tomas polishes his boots twice before the interview and checks the clock every minute."	IMPLIED	The repeated actions suggest nervousness, but nervousness is not directly stated.
7	"The poem says that the river remembers every name it carries."	STATED	The speaker directly makes this statement, even though it is figurative.
8	"The historian writes that the workers organized a strike in 1912."	STATED	The historical event and date are directly stated.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **STATED:** "The story explains that the queen pardoned the prisoner."
- **IMPLIED:** "Dev leaves his packed suitcase beside the door and does not eat breakfast."

Challenge: Passage: "Leila sets three places at the table. When the train whistle fades, she puts one plate back in the cupboard." Inference: Leila feels disappointed that someone did not arrive. Details: "three places" and "puts one plate back."

For PROVE IT, accept accurate explanations that distinguish explicit wording from an inference based on details. Implied items may support more than one reasonable inference if students cite the passage accurately.
