Cooling a City

- ① On a hot July afternoon, temperatures on a treeless city block can be far higher than in a nearby park. This pattern is called the urban heat island effect. Asphalt and dark roofs absorb solar energy, then release heat slowly after sunset. Trees alter this local climate. Their leafy canopy shades pavement, and water released through leaves cools the air. Scientists use the term transpiration for this movement of water from plants into the atmosphere.
- ② City planners study where heat is most intense because the effect is not distributed equally. Neighborhoods with fewer parks and more paved surfaces often face greater exposure to dangerous temperatures. This unequal burden can affect health, especially for older adults, outdoor workers, and people without reliable air conditioning. To mitigate heat, planners may plant street trees, install reflective roofs, or create shaded bus stops. These strategies are part of climate adaptation, efforts that help communities respond to conditions already changing.
- ③ However, trees are not a complete solution. Young trees need water and care, and their benefits grow as their canopies expand over time. Planners also need evidence about which streets lack shade and which residents have limited access to cooling. A city map that combines temperature readings, tree cover, and population data can guide investments. When officials explain these choices clearly, residents can evaluate whether a proposed project is equitable as well as effective.
