The Showcase Rover

- ① On the morning of the school robotics showcase, Maya arrived at the auditorium with her tool bag clinking against her knee. Her team had spent weeks building a small rover that could sort colored blocks. When the rover refused to move during a practice run, Jordan said, "Do not throw in the towel yet." He pointed to a loose wire near the battery and handed Maya a screwdriver. Instead of packing up, the team bent over the rover, tested each connection, and replaced the wire. Soon, the wheels rolled forward, drawing a cheer from the students waiting nearby.
- ② By noon, the team had repaired the wire, but the sorting arm began dropping blocks. "Back to square one," Maya groaned as the blocks scattered across the stage. Jordan opened the design notebook and compared the arm's measurements with their earliest sketches. He removed the arm, reset its angle, and ran another test. While he worked, Maya told the younger visitors to keep an eye on the rover. The visitors stood beside the table, watching its wheels and arm closely. When the arm lifted three blocks without dropping them, Maya called Jordan over to see the result. The repair seemed promising to everyone nearby.
- ③ Near the end of the showcase, a judge asked why the team had not abandoned the rover after its setbacks. Maya replied, "We learned to roll with the punches." She described the loose wire and faulty arm, then explained how the team changed its plan after each surprise. After the rover sorted its last block, the team was on cloud nine. Their smiles, raised hands, and loud cheers filled the auditorium. Maya packed the tool bag while Jordan photographed the rover, knowing that the next design would bring more problems and more chances to adapt.

3	What does “keep an eye on the rover” mean? Give one context clue that supports your answer.	It means to watch the rover carefully. The visitors stand beside the table and watch its wheels and arm closely.
4	What does “on cloud nine” mean in paragraph 3? Use two details from the passage to explain your answer.	It means extremely happy. The team smiles, raises their hands, and cheers loudly after the rover sorts its last block.
