A Later Bell for Riverton High

- ① Riverton High should begin classes at 8:30 a.m. instead of 7:40. Teens' body clocks naturally shift later during puberty, so many students struggle to fall asleep early enough for a very early school day. The American Academy of Pediatrics has recommended that middle and high schools start at 8:30 or later. A later start would not make school less demanding. It would give students a better chance to arrive alert, participate in class, and learn during first period. That change could make the daily schedule better match students' sleep needs.
- ② Critics say a later bell would create transportation problems, especially if elementary and high school buses share drivers. That concern deserves planning, but it does not prove the proposal is unworkable. Districts can revise bus routes, change the order of school pickups, or use separate schedules for different grade levels. Riverton could survey families and test possible routes before making a final decision. The need to organize buses is a practical challenge, not a reason to ignore evidence about teen sleep and learning. With careful planning, transportation can support rather than block a healthier schedule for students.
- ③ Others argue that a later start would interfere with sports, jobs, and homework because dismissal would occur later. Yet the school can adjust practice times, coordinate with local employers, and protect the same number of instructional minutes. These changes may require cooperation, but inconvenience is not the same as impossibility. When a schedule affects every student's readiness to learn, the school should weigh temporary adjustments against the continuing cost of students beginning class tired. Riverton should adopt the 8:30 start after developing a transportation and activities plan with families and staff before the next school year.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The school library should offer e-books in addition to print books because students could read on a phone, tablet, or computer when they cannot visit the building. Some people argue that e-books would cost too much and reduce interest in printed books. However, the library can choose a limited collection of high-demand titles, and keeping print books available means digital access expands choices rather than replacing them.
