The Arctic Backup Library

- ① High above the Arctic Circle, the Svalbard Global Seed Vault is built into a mountainside near Longyearbyen, Norway. Its location is cold and remote, but the vault is not a museum for rare plants. It is a backup library for crop seeds, including varieties of rice, wheat, and beans that genebanks around the world have already collected. Each participating genebank keeps ownership of its own deposits. If a local collection is damaged by war, disaster, or equipment failure, the stored seeds can help rebuild it. The vault opened in 2008, and its first shipments arrived from several nations.
- ② Seeds are dried before shipment, sealed in moisture-resistant packets, and stored at about minus 18 degrees Celsius. Dryness matters because water can wake a seed's metabolic processes, shortening the time it remains viable, or able to germinate. The vault's managers do not grow or test the seeds on site. Instead, the depositing genebanks monitor their samples and replace them when needed. In 2015, a research center in Syria requested seeds it had placed in the vault, after conflict made its local facility unsafe. That withdrawal showed why a backup collection must be both protected and accessible.
- ③ The vault does not promise that every packet will last forever. Different species survive storage for different lengths of time, and even carefully dried seeds slowly lose their ability to sprout. For that reason, genebanks periodically plant small samples, record the results, and send fresh seeds when a collection needs renewal. The mountain site adds protection, yet protection alone is not the goal. A reserve is useful only if the people responsible for a crop can recover it when circumstances demand. In that balance between long-term safety and practical access, the vault serves agriculture beyond Norway.
