Reporting on Hot Bus Rides

- ① When the school newspaper investigated whether summer heat was changing bus rides, reporter Jalen began with sources that could be traced. He downloaded temperature records from the National Weather Service and checked the district transportation office's public route-delay notices. The records showed dates and measurements, while the notices documented when buses arrived late. Jalen also interviewed two drivers, asking permission to quote them by name. He kept a source log with links, publication dates, contact information, and notes about what each source could support. A social media post claiming buses were melting gave him an idea, but not evidence.
- ② To understand a long technical report, Jalen asked an AI tool to make a summary and list questions for follow-up. He treated that output as a starting point, not a source. The tool incorrectly said that every delayed bus ride occurred above 95 degrees, so Jalen returned to the original records and found delays on cooler days as well. He did not paste student names, driver phone numbers, or unpublished interview notes into the tool. In his draft, he credited the weather records, district notices, and interviews. He also stated that AI helped organize questions, allowing readers to judge its limited role.
- ③ Before publication, Jalen compared each major sentence with his log. A chart used district delay notices, so its caption named the office and linked to the data page. A quotation from a driver was checked with that driver for accuracy and context. Jalen removed a photograph that a student had sent because he could not confirm who owned it or whether the people pictured had agreed to publication. His final article distinguished measured data from personal experience and linked readers to the original materials. Responsible research meant more than collecting information. It meant making his evidence, choices, and limits visible.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

For a report on whether the library needs longer weekend hours, I would compare the library's posted attendance statistics with a survey I conduct with permission, and I would name and link both sources in my article. I could ask an AI tool to suggest survey questions without entering student names, then check any summary or claim against the attendance data and survey responses.

Accept equivalent answers that accurately identify Jalen's verification, attribution, privacy, consent, and disclosure practices. For Part 3, look for two identifiable sources, clear crediting, a privacy safeguard, and a plan to verify AI output.
