Trees as City Infrastructure

- ① On summer afternoons, pavement can make city neighborhoods far hotter than nearby parks. This heat threatens health, raises energy costs, and falls hardest on residents with little shade. Cities should treat tree planting as essential infrastructure, not decoration. Expanding tree cover can cool streets, improve public health, and make neighborhoods more equitable. Examining temperature data, health effects, and access to green space shows why a coordinated planting plan deserves public funding.
- ② Trees lower surface and air temperatures by shading sidewalks and releasing water vapor through their leaves. In one well-known example, researchers have repeatedly found cooler conditions beneath tree canopy than over exposed pavement, though results vary by species, weather, and location. Cooler blocks can also lessen the danger of heat illness during heat waves. A city plan should protect mature trees while planting diverse, climate-suited species.
- ③ Heat is also a fairness issue. In many U.S. cities, historically underinvested neighborhoods have fewer trees and more heat-absorbing surfaces than wealthier areas. Planting decisions should use local heat maps and resident input, rather than simply favoring highly visible streets. Funding maintenance, watering, and young-tree care matters as much as planting day. By joining sound science with fair distribution, cities can build cooler places for everyone over time.
