Rebuilding Oyster Reefs

- ① Along many U.S. coastlines, oyster reefs once formed broad, rough barriers in shallow water. Oysters attach to hard surfaces and grow in clusters, creating spaces where small fish and crabs can shelter. As oysters feed, they filter particles from the water, although filtering alone cannot solve pollution from sewage, farms, or industry. Harvesting, disease, and the loss of suitable habitat have reduced many natural reefs. Because the reefs affect both water conditions and coastal habitat, scientists and local groups have begun rebuilding some of them.
- ② Restoration teams often place recycled oyster shells or other approved hard material on the sea floor, giving young oysters a place to settle. In some projects, hatcheries raise oyster larvae before releasing them onto that material. Teams then measure such changes as oyster survival, reef size, water cloudiness, and the number of fish nearby. These measurements matter because a reef that looks larger may not yet be functioning well. Results also depend on local salinity, storms, and continuing sources of pollution, so restoration plans must be tested and adjusted over time.
- ③ Rebuilding oyster reefs is not a quick substitute for preventing pollution or protecting coasts in other ways. Still, the earlier evidence shows why carefully designed projects can be useful: reefs can support habitat and improve water conditions, while monitoring can reveal whether a project is working under local conditions. A sound conclusion, then, is that restoration should pair suitable hard material with long-term measurement and broader pollution control. This approach follows from the reefs' multiple benefits as well as the limits that scientists observe during restoration in changing coastal environments.

1	Which sentence begins the concluding section, and what limitation does it establish?	The first sentence of paragraph 3 begins the conclusion. It establishes that reef rebuilding cannot replace pollution prevention or other coastal protections.
2	How does the second sentence of the conclusion bring together ideas from the earlier paragraphs?	It connects the reefs' habitat and water-condition benefits from paragraph 1 with the need for monitoring from paragraph 2.
3	Why does the conclusion recommend long-term measurement instead of treating reef size alone as proof of success?	Paragraph 2 explains that a larger reef may not be functioning well and that results depend on local conditions, storms, and pollution.
4	Does the conclusion introduce a new central topic? Explain how its recommended actions follow from the passage.	No. Suitable hard material comes from the restoration methods, long-term measurement follows from the monitoring evidence, and pollution control responds to the limits of oyster filtering.
