MLA CORRECT

The quotation follows MLA punctuation and citation rules. After a full introductory signal phrase, use a comma or colon before the quotation, and place a parenthetical citation after the closing quotation mark.

Jordan observes, “Night classes serve many workers” (56).

NEEDS REVISION

The quotation has a punctuation or citation-placement error. Check the mark after the signal phrase, the quotation marks, and the position of the citation and final punctuation.

Revise this sentence so it follows MLA rules for a direct quotation: The researcher asks "Can a model predict floods?". (42)

1	The historian writes, "The treaty altered trade routes" (Nguyen 44).	CORRECT	A comma introduces the quotation, and the citation comes before the final period.
2	Lopez asks, "Who benefits from this policy?" (18)	CORRECT	The question mark stays inside the quotation marks, and no extra period follows the citation.
3	Carter states "The archive preserves fragile records" (61).	REVISE	A comma is needed after the introductory signal phrase.
4	In her report, Singh explains that "the data require caution" (103).	CORRECT	The quotation is grammatically integrated with "that," and the citation precedes the final period.
5	Miller notes, "The bridge opened in 1932". (77)	REVISE	The period is misplaced before the citation and should appear after the citation.
6	Patel argues, "The seed bank protects biodiversity". (29)	REVISE	The citation should follow the closing quotation mark, and the final period should follow the citation.
7	The editor offers this warning: "Deadlines shape the reporting process" (8).	CORRECT	A colon correctly introduces the quotation, and the citation is placed before the final period.
