### The Last Lightkeeper

- ① At dusk, Mara climbed the lighthouse stairs with a wrench in her pocket and salt stiffening her coat. Below, the harbor held its boats like dark seeds in a cupped hand. Tomorrow, technicians would install an automated beacon, and the keeper's room would become a museum. Mara had heard the news for months, yet tonight it landed like a gull on her shoulder, light but impossible to ignore. Each step rang beneath her boots. The tower seemed to count with her, asking whether a place could remember the hands that had kept it alive.
- ② At the lantern room, Mara polished the brass rail although no visitor would see it. The glass around the lamp caught the last sun and broke it into thin coins across the floor. She thought of her father, who had taught her to trim the wick when storms erased the horizon. “The light does not fight the sea,” he had said. “It tells sailors where not to go.” Now the lamp's steady pulse filled the room, a small heart refusing to hurry. Outside, fog gathered at the windows and pressed its pale face against the panes.
- ③ When Mara switched the lamp off at midnight, darkness entered so quickly that she gripped the rail. Then the new beacon blinked from the pier, precise and cold, cutting one white path through the fog. It did the work well. Still, Mara carried the old lens downstairs as if it were a sleeping animal, careful not to wake what it had witnessed. In the keeper's room, she set it beside the logbooks. Their pages smelled of oil, rain, and years. The tower no longer needed her hands, but it kept the shape of them in every worn stair and polished latch.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

On the final afternoon before the city closed the old train station, I stood beneath its iron clock. Pigeons lifted from the rafters like scraps of gray paper, and the departure board blinked its tired eyes above empty benches. My grandmother had arrived here with one suitcase and a recipe folded into her coat pocket. Now workers rolled blueprints across the ticket counter. The station did not protest, yet its wide doors seemed to hold their breath, keeping one last space for travelers whose names had faded from the schedule. The early simile makes the pigeons seem fragile and disposable, establishing a wistful mood and framing the station as a vulnerable subject. Later personification gives the board and doors a witness's role, so the paragraph moves from visible closure to a theme that redevelopment can erase living memories.

Accept supported interpretations that accurately identify figurative language and explain its effect on subject, form, mood, or theme. For Part 3, verify the paragraph length, the required figurative language, and exactly two analytical sentences.
