The Butterfly Release

- ① Last Friday, our class carried a small box to the school garden. Inside were six monarch butterflies. First, I spoke in a clear classroom voice so everyone could hear. I said, "We raised these butterflies from tiny caterpillars." Then I paused after the sentence. The pause gave my listeners time to picture the caterpillars growing.
- ② Next, I opened the box slowly and held it near a purple flower. One butterfly climbed onto my finger. I said, "Look closely!" with a little excitement in my voice. I did not shout, because we were outside near other classes. After a short pause, I lowered my hand. The butterfly opened its wings and flew over the garden fence.
- ③ Finally, I told my classmates what happened next. "The butterfly found a sunny place to rest," I explained. I used a calm voice for that detail. At the end, I said, "I hope our garden helps more butterflies." I slowed down for the last sentence and looked at my listeners. My report had a beginning, middle, and ending, so the story was easy to follow.
