### The Monarch Journey

- ① Today I am reporting on monarch butterflies and their long migration. Each fall, many monarchs from eastern North America fly to mountain forests in central Mexico. Some travel as far as 3,000 miles. This journey is amazing because monarchs are small, yet they travel a very long way. First, I will explain how they prepare for the journey.
- ② Before leaving, monarchs eat nectar from flowers and store fat in their bodies. This stored energy helps fuel their flight when food is hard to find. In Mexico, the butterflies rest on oyamel fir trees. Thousands may cover the branches like orange and black leaves. The mountain air is cool, and the trees help protect the butterflies from rain and wind.
- ③ Finally, monarch migration matters because the butterflies need safe places to feed and rest. People can help by planting native nectar flowers and protecting habitats. I am sharing this report with my classmates because we can notice monarchs near our school. Now we know that small animals can make a huge journey and need places to live.
