How Bees Cool a Hive

- ① On a hot day, honey bees work together to keep their hive from getting too warm. Some bees stand at the entrance and beat their wings quickly. This moving air helps ventilate the hive. Other bees bring in water and spread tiny drops inside. As the water evaporates, it takes heat away, much like sweat cooling your skin.
- ② Inside the hive, worker bees have different jobs. Bees near the entrance may fan in a line, so fresh air moves farther into the crowded space. Bees deeper inside pass water drops from one bee to another. The bees do not use machines or ice. Their wing beats and water work together to lower the hive's temperature.
- ③ When evening comes, the air outside often becomes cooler. The bees can slow their fanning, but they stay alert. A hive with many bees can still hold heat. By working as a group, the bees protect the wax comb, where they store honey and raise young bees. Careful teamwork helps the whole colony survive hot weather.
