Busy Beaver

- ① On a quiet pond, a beaver begins work at sunset. It carries branches to the water and packs mud between them. The animal builds a dam that slows the stream. Behind the dam, a deep pool can form. This pool gives the beaver a safer place to rest, swim, and store food during winter months.
- ② Beavers have special teeth for cutting wood. Their front teeth keep growing, so the animals gnaw on trees often. A beaver may drag a willow branch across the bank. Then it uses its wide, flat tail to slap the water. That sound can warn other beavers when danger is near. They listen closely for danger.
- ③ Inside a lodge, the beaver family stays dry and warm. The entrance is under water, which helps keep many wild animals away. In autumn, beavers collect small sticks and place them near the lodge. When ice covers the pond, the family can eat this stored food. A busy beaver prepares carefully for cold weather ahead.

4	In paragraph 3, divide under into syllables. What type is the first syllable?	un/der; un is a closed syllable.
