Garden Labels

- ① On Tuesday, our class made labels for a pollinator garden. We printed the plant names in dark pencil so visitors could read them. A label for milkweed stood near the tall green stems. Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed leaves. Clear labels helped us match each plant to its name without guessing during our morning walk outside.
- ② Before we wrote, Mia tested her pencil on scrap paper. She made letters that rested on the line and left a small space between words. Then she checked that her lowercase letters were not taller than her capital letters. Her label read, "Purple Coneflower." The two words were easy to see from several steps away.
- ③ At the end, we placed the labels beside the plants and read them from arm's length away. We could tell the difference between "Bee Balm" and "Basil" because each letter was formed carefully. Our garden signs will stay outside for weeks. Neat printing will help families, students, and gardeners read them with ease on every visit.
