A Clear Park Report

- ① On Friday, the third-grade Green Team counted litter at Maple Park. They found 18 plastic bottles, 12 snack wrappers, and 6 aluminum cans near the playground. To share these results, Luis made a poster for the school meeting. He chose the title "What We Found at Maple Park," so everyone would know the topic right away.
- ② First, Luis drew a bar graph with one bar for bottles, wrappers, and cans. The graph showed that bottles were the most common kind of litter. He used three colors and wrote a label under each bar. This visual display helped people compare the groups quickly instead of searching through a long list of numbers.
- ③ At the meeting, Luis began by naming the topic, Maple Park litter. Next, he told what the graph showed. Last, he explained the Green Team's plan to place recycling bins near the playground and check them each week. He ended by asking students to use the bins. This order made the information easy to follow.
