### My Beaver Report

- ① For my animal report, I wanted to explain how beavers change a pond. I read *Beavers* by Gail Gibbons and wrote notes in a notebook. The book gave me ideas, but the ideas were not mine. I planned to tell readers where I learned the facts. Giving credit helps readers find the same source and shows that I did not pretend the ideas were my own.
- ② One note said that beavers use branches, stones, and mud when they build dams. I did not copy that sentence into my report. Instead, I wrote, "Beavers make dams from natural materials." This is in my own words, but it still came from the book. After the sentence, I added this source note: (Beavers, Gail Gibbons).
- ③ If I wanted to use the book's exact words, I would copy only the words I need and put quotation marks around them. Then I would name *Beavers* and Gail Gibbons right next to the quotation. I would not copy a whole part of the book and leave out the source. Even when I explain a fact in my own words, I must give credit because the fact came from Gail Gibbons's book.
