Quiet Places for Birds

- ① Some city parks set aside quiet zones for birds. These areas help birds rest and find food without loud noise nearby. A study of city songbirds found that some birds sing louder when traffic is noisy. Singing louder can use energy that birds need for other jobs, such as finding insects or feeding chicks well.
- ② Quiet zones should include bushes and small trees. Birds can use plants as cover when they rest or look for food. In one study, birds in places with more plant cover spent less time watching for danger than birds in open places. With cover, birds may have more time to search for seeds, berries, and insects.
- ③ Park visitors can also help keep quiet zones useful. Signs can ask people to stay on paths and keep dogs on leashes. Staying on paths protects low plants where birds may hide or hunt. Leashed dogs are less likely to run into bushes and scare birds. These simple rules can leave the area calmer for wildlife.
