How Beavers Build

- ① Beavers are large rodents that live near ponds, streams, and rivers. Their broad, flat tails help them swim and balance on land. Thick brown fur keeps their bodies warm in cold water. Beavers have strong front teeth that keep growing. With these teeth, they cut branches for food and for building homes called lodges near the water.
- ② When heavy rain falls, water in a stream can rise quickly. This higher water may flood a beaver's lodge. As a result, beavers build dams from sticks, mud, and stones. A dam slows the water and helps form a deeper pond. Because the pond is deeper, the entrance to the lodge can stay underwater, which helps keep some predators away.
- ③ To make a dam, a beaver first carries branches to a shallow place in the stream. Next, it pushes the branches into the streambed. Then it packs mud and small stones between the branches. After that, the beaver adds more materials where water slips through. Over time, the dam becomes stronger and the pond behind it grows.

2	What organizational pattern does paragraph 2 use? Give one cause and its effect from the paragraph.	Cause/effect. Heavy rain can raise stream water and flood a lodge, so beavers build dams. A dam also makes a deeper pond that can help protect the lodge entrance.
3	How is the structure of paragraph 2 different from the structure of paragraph 3? How does each structure help the reader?	Paragraph 2 connects causes and results, while paragraph 3 gives steps in order. Cause/effect explains why dams are useful, and sequence explains how a dam is built.
4	Which paragraph would best help a reader learn how a beaver makes a dam? Use two signal words from that paragraph to explain your choice.	Paragraph 3. Signal words such as "first," "next," "then," and "after that" show the building steps in order.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Because a bean seed gets water, its seed coat softens. As a result, a tiny root can grow out. First, a bean seed takes in water. Next, a root grows downward, and later a shoot grows upward. Cause/effect helps readers understand why the seed changes, while sequence shows the order of the changes.
