2	What genre is paragraph 2? Name one clue that shows this genre.	Fairy tale. A fox talks and changes into a prince.
3	How does paragraph 3 show characteristics of a poem?	It is written in short lines and has rhyming end words, such as night and light.
4	Tell one difference between paragraph 1 and paragraph 2 that helps you identify their genres.	Paragraph 1 has a problem that could happen in real life, while paragraph 2 has magic, including a talking fox that becomes a prince.
