Our Bean Garden

- ① Our class made a small garden beside the playground. First, we pulled weeds and loosened the hard soil with hand tools. Then we added dark compost that smelled like leaves after rain. The compost helps plants get nutrients from the soil. By the end of the morning, the bare patch was soft, rich, and ready for seeds.
- ② We planted bean seeds because bean plants grow quickly. Each seed went into a small hole about an inch deep. We covered the holes with soil and gave them a gentle drink of water. After a week, pale green shoots pushed up through the ground. The shoots showed us that the seeds had begun to grow.
- ③ Caring for the garden became part of our school day. Two students carried watering cans outside when the soil looked dry. Others checked for weeds that could take water and space from the bean plants. We also watched for small white flowers, which can later become bean pods. These jobs kept the young plants healthy and helped our garden change each week.
