Our School Garden

- ① Our class garden gives students a peaceful place to learn. First, the raised beds hold bright flowers and crunchy vegetables. Bees visit the blooms, while worms help make the soil rich. During science time, we measure plants and draw what we see. Each week, we record changes in a notebook. The garden turns our schoolyard into an outdoor classroom.
- ② Caring for the garden also teaches us to work together. On Mondays, one team pulls weeds near the tomatoes. Next, another team fills watering cans and gives each plant a drink. If a tool is muddy, we rinse it and return it to the shed. Shared jobs keep the garden healthy and tidy all year.
- ③ Harvest day shows why the garden matters to our school. In late spring, we pick lettuce, peas, and radishes when they are ready. Then the cafeteria staff may add some vegetables to a salad. We wash our hands before tasting food we grew. A garden can help a school learn, share, and eat fresh food.
