A Bat's Night Map

- ① At dusk, a little brown bat leaves its roost and begins to hunt. It sends out tiny, high-pitched sounds that people usually cannot hear. The sounds bounce off moths, tree trunks, and walls. Echoes return to the bat's ears, helping it notice where objects are. This sound-and-echo system is called echolocation. It helps the bat travel and find insects in darkness.
- ② As the bat flies closer to an insect, the echoes come back more quickly. The bat can use that change to judge distance. It also listens for differences in the echoes from a smooth pond and a rough leafy branch. These details help the bat steer safely. A bat does not use echolocation only for hunting. It can also use echoes to avoid obstacles, or objects in its path.
- ③ Young bats must learn to control their calls and listen carefully to returning echoes. In a crowded cave, many bats may call at once, yet each bat can pay attention to its own echoes. Scientists study bat calls with special microphones because many calls are too high for human ears. By studying the calls, scientists can learn how bats move, hunt, and communicate with one another at night.
