Garden Signs

- ① On Friday, Maya helped make signs for the school garden. Her first sign had a short heading, "Bean Bed." She printed the letters the same height and left a finger-width space between each word. The sign also had one neat sentence: "Please stay on the path." People could read it from a few steps away.
- ② Next, Maya made a sign for the watering can. She began each line at the left edge. Her letters did not lean or crowd together. She used dark pencil marks, but she did not press so hard that the paper tore. The finished sign said, "Water after school." Maya checked that the lowercase a and e were easy to tell apart.
- ③ Before hanging the signs, Maya read every word slowly. She noticed that the word "path" had slipped too close to "the," so she erased and wrote it again with a clear gap. Then she placed the signs where visitors could see them. The garden looked more organized, and the directions were simple to follow for everyone.
